## *"From the Chair"*

I am writing this whilst still feeling the 'warm afterglow' of the Nottingham City Race and still feeling proud of and delighted by the hugely impressive event we were able to put on. My thanks go to Tony Horsewill, Janet Evans and David Olivant for their excellent work and not forgetting Chris Bosley of LEI who acted as controller and, of course, everyone who turned out and helped on the day. From the feedback we received on the day and, subsequently, on-line, we appear to have set a standard for our City Race that I am keen to maintain. The event achieved a number of things, the most important of which were to create an attractive fixture to which orienteers were willing to travel, to showcase our Club and our sport to the wider community of Nottingham and to attract new interest and new membership. Many Club members took part but many did not and I can only urge members to take the opportunity, in future years, to experience this unique view of Nottingham City centre whilst enjoying some first class orienteering.

Having now emerged from a 'real Winter', the Spring is packed with some top competitions. I'm sure that we have all hoped that the ferocity of the Winter has had an adverse impact on undergrowth in many of our woodlands. My mind tells me that this should have been the case but the fresh scratches on my legs and my still badly swelling hand tell me that it hasn't necessarily been so!

The major event season began at Belvoir Castle, on a beautiful sunny day and we combined the Midlands Championships event with our own Club Championships. We had an excellent day of orienteering enjoying woodland which had not been used for many years. Congratulations to all of those who have become Club Champions in their various classes. We will be holding a

prize-giving, as we did last year, immediately after the AGM, which will take place in the Autumn.

With the JK and the British Middle and Sprints Championships now complete, we still have the prospect of the Long Distance Championships on Cannock Chase in a couple of days time. Well done to all of those who have put in notable performances so far and good luck to everyone who is competing in Staffordshire on May Day Bank Holiday weekend, I hope you enjoy the events and achieve the performance you are aiming for.

Congratulations also to the inaugural winners of our most recent venture, the Winter League. Whilst this was only conducted on a small scale, experimental basis, the Committee feels that it has demonstrated it's worth in being able to offer local events which are, relatively, simple to organise and accessible to people who don't want to travel too far to enjoy their sport. We will be organising a larger Winter League programme for the Autumn/Winter 2010 / 2011 period.

The Summer League begins early this year, with the first event at Bulwell Hall Park. You will see from the fixtures that we have tried to focus the locations in parkland areas. This is partly to avoid the undergrowth of some of our traditional Summer League locations but also to provide accessible venues which are more likely to attract new members to come and try out the sport.

We have also recently seen the opening of our third Satellite Club, this time at Bramcote. I believe that this is proving to be a highly successful project which is adding value to the Club, offering existing orienteers some welcome training and also offering new people a non-threatening opportunity to try out our sport. Details of the Bramcote Club night will emerge shortly. I've been asked a few times whether I think that Satellite Clubs exist mainly to attract new members or are there to offer more local training and development facilities for existing club members. In my opinion, the answer is that they are there to do both. These Satellite Clubs are able to take our sport and our club to a more local level but they are also there to be supported by existing members if they find them convenient and accessible. So if there is a Satellite Club near you, feel free to go along, support it and hopefully improve your orienteering skills.

The Satellite Clubs and our greater emphasis on more local events to attract new members are key ingredients in our recent award of nearly £10,000 from Sport England. I know I speak for the whole Committee in saying how delighted we are to have received this award and we believe that it will mark a real milestone in the development of the Club. With the award, obviously, come obligations and expectations and you can read more about it further on in this edition. As I write this, the cheque from Sport England is still 'in the

post' but they assure me that this is just a minor hitch owing to their end of financial year procedures. As soon as the money arrives, we will be placing an order for our new Sport Ident kit.

Finally, over what has been a busy Autumn, Winter and, now Spring, can I offer my grateful thanks to everyone who has volunteered to organise, plan or control events and, of course to the many more who have carried out the key roles required to make an event go smoothly.

## *'More Hands for More Faces'*



### Funding From Sport England

#### What It's For and How We Got It

Many of you will have seen the news of our recent success in obtaining nearly £10,000 of funding from Sport England. With this money we can buy a basic set of Sport Ident (SI) equipment of our own and fund a Club Development Officer for one year. This is a great success for the Club but we need to make sure that we use it well.

The bid came about because the Club Committee saw a number of challenges that we needed to address. Firstly, we had found it extremely difficult to recruit a volunteer to act as Volunteer Coordinator (the irony wasn't lost on us). We felt we needed to do something to change our game in this respect and make the organisation of volunteers less onerous and more systematic. That fed into our second challenge which was that it was becoming increasingly difficult to persuade people to come forward to volunteer to organise and plan events.

In addition, we wanted to increase the membership of the club and get more people involved in local events, in line with the BOF strategy and, finally, we wanted those new local events and our existing Summer League to use Sport Ident timing and, thereby increase their effectiveness and quality. Following the experience of EMOA and their collaboration with Sport England on the Satellite Clubs project we decided that the Sport England Small Grants Fund was probably the right approach to our problem and set about researching what we needed to do and preparing to apply.

Most of the interaction with Sport England took place 'on line' and their documentation made it very clear what they would expect of us. We have had to demonstrate that we are a well run Club with proper governance. We have had to show that we are financially sound and provide things like copies of our accounts, bank statements and our projections for the finances of the Club over the next three years. We've had to obtain a referee who has known the Club for a long time and can vouch for us.

Most importantly, however, we've had to be really specific about how we would use the money and what benefits we would deliver and show how those benefits align with the overall aims of Sport England. In this regard, the BOF strategy has proved really helpful. It so closely aligns with that of Sport England that, as long as we could show how we were supporting that strategy, it allowed us to build a really strong case.

So what did we promise to deliver?

#### **More Hands....**

we promised that we would increase volunteer participation by 15 new volunteers taking part in organising and running events.

#### **More faces....**

we promised that we would increase the number of events by 6 (which will, in effect be a 2010/11 Winter League) and increase the participation across all Club events by 42 new people experiencing orienteering in at least one of those events. To facilitate this, we will lay on coaching and 'taster' sessions at all of our 2010 Summer League and 2010 / 2011 Winter League events

#### **This is all supported by....**

the appointment of a Club development Officer for a one year term, providing 150 hrs of development work which will deliver these outcomes.  
The purchase of a basic set of SI equipment allowing us, initially, 30 controls 'in the forest' together with all of the equipment to manage an event, produce results, etc. For larger events, the East Midlands equipment has been pledged by EMOA in support of us, thereby ensuring that we can provide comprehensive SI support to every event we organise.  
The project commenced on 1<sup>st</sup> April 2010 and lasts for 12 months. Catherine Hughes has now been appointed as the Club development Officer and we are awaiting the imminent arrival of the cash in order to purchase the SI kit.  
Once we are satisfied that we have it all up and running, the Committee will work hard to ensure that the legacy of the project is solidly built upon.  
In short, however, it means that the Club will have more members, more equipment and more events which must be a good thing for us all.

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## *The First Nottingham City Race*

### A Planner's Notebook

It was still dark as the first of the timing devices was attached to a lamppost in the Nottingham Park Estate with the hopefully impregnable 'Gripples'. In a flash the device was activated and it was time to silently hurry on a few yards down the road to place the second on another strategic location. As the wire was wound around the device using the dim light emanating from the Victorian lamps, the carefully rehearsed procedure benefited from the practise undertaken the day before by the stooping shadowy figure. Just 5:15am and not a curtain stirred; seemingly unobserved, would he be in time to complete the challenging task ahead? As he moved on to a park bench, light from the breaking dawn slowly illuminated the scene, revealing the darkly dressed perpetrator. But wait a minute, Ron Hill tracksters, fleecy top, SI dibber in hand; what exactly was this erstwhile upstanding member of NOC doing, acting out the climactic scene from 'The Heroes of Telemark'? Well, to cut to the chase, with highly valued assistance from Alan Beardsley and Steve Wickham, the task of setting out the 45 controls was completed by 9:15am on Sunday 11<sup>th</sup> April and all was in place for the inaugural Nottingham City Race.

Planning had begun in the autumn with provisional ideas traced out on a draft map produced by David Olivant partly from a Google satellite image. The famous Market Square was the prime site for the start and finish. This had the potential to be a great social space, and so it turned out, but the close proximity of the tramway on two sides presented the first conundrum since the courses would have to be funnelled through the same narrow section of the map on both outward and return legs. The not entirely satisfactory solution was to place the first control for most courses at the top of Clumber Street, quite a busy thoroughfare, but once there the courses could fan out satisfactorily into the Lace Market.

In sketching out preliminary ideas my philosophy towards the event developed. In some areas there were intricacies to the terrain but not on any great scale. Different to the more familiar forests (in most cities I guess it is similar), challenge for the competitor is provided by route choice rather than fine navigation into a difficult control site. I played with some ideas of having a series of fast, short legs in the Lace Market but the draft legs all seemed a little too straightforward with highly predictable routes to follow. Therefore I arrived at the conclusion that longer legs served the purpose of providing route choice conundrums, with the contours of the sandstone ridge crossing the area providing additional physical and mental challenge. Another important principle in my view was to ensure the competitors visited some notable and picturesque parts of our city – at least then, if the orienteering

challenge was not quite at the technical end of the spectrum, at least they will have enjoyed visiting some memorable locations. Significant among these were the Old Trip to Jerusalem, the Park Tunnel and Stairs, some historical parts of the Lace Market, the Canal, Castle Crag and Standard Hill – just to mention a few. One route choice I was pleased with was that through the Park Tunnel, finishing up the long flight of stairs. As I anticipated, some competitors arrived at the top, in some oxygen debt and momentarily disoriented due to the 180° turn. Incidentally, these stairs are pretty cavernous and I was only happy for them to be negotiated in the upward direction; furthermore, I also made sure the Juniors would not encounter them on Health & Safety grounds – just take a look at the top entrance to the stairs and imagine racing towards them in wet conditions to see what I mean! One other principle was to avoid complications on this inaugural event when the time available for seeking permissions, arranging access, completing the map and so on, was a little limited. As we found, the City Races are organisationally much more complex than a traditional forest event – just consider how many landowners and tenants there are – so keeping it relatively simple I hoped to ensure the event went ahead successfully and provided a good foundation on which we could build in future years. Options such as visiting the Castle grounds are still available for future planners. A word or two about control mounting: reading various web blogs by city race planners, the use of ‘Gripples’ was highly recommended. These are proprietary steel cable ties with a clever ratchet link that makes them reusable. A special tool is required to release the link so, made of high tensile steel cable, they are about as impregnable as it is practicable to arrange. As always the web was indispensable in finding out about these ties. My remaining questions were very efficiently answered by a call to the manufacturers in Sheffield who remembered dealing with SHUOC for their city sprint event and told me exactly what I would need! 1mm ties are the ones to use, they are sufficiently strong yet narrow enough to pass through the SI sensor hole without impeding the dibber. They make control placement relatively quick, an important consideration given the luxury of placing controls the day before is not an option. The 1m cables were long enough for most control sites; I had some 2m ones as well but the extra length usually impeded the speed of control placement. One other thing; I used the ‘summer league’ kites with the control codes written on the kite – the easiest way I could think of, but on the downside, more effort for the whizz-kid.

Having placed almost all of the controls on the morning, my worst fears were almost realised when I received a call from Alan to say that he had found one of the controls in the Lace Market already vandalised before about 8 o’clock in the morning. Fortunately this turned out to be an isolated incident and all the controls remained secure throughout the event – which was a big relief! For future planners there are many diverse Health & Safety issues to consider, from thinking about road crossings to negotiating with the City

Council to clear up broken glass left by late night revellers; as organiser, Janet will have many such stories. To conclude, many thanks to David for producing such a good map, to Bob Alderson for patiently negotiating so many permissions, to Steve Green for having the vision and enthusiasm to get the event off the ground, to Chris Bosley for his constructive controlling advice and to the employees of the City Council and the Park Estate for being so approachable and amenable to our requests. I thought Janet Evan’s excellent organisation really helped to provide a very friendly and vibrant atmosphere in the Market Square and I hope those of you who competed enjoyed yourselves and left with happy memories. I went home sufficiently content and pretty tired. Incidentally, do take a look at Ray’s photos on the web which capture the event really well.

## *The First Nottingham City Race*

### An Organiser’s Thoughts

I was asked in October if I would organise the first Nottingham City race that was due to take place in April. Having done a few of these urban races and found them to be good fun I agreed. My first thoughts were that it would be a doddle – no parking or toilets to worry about, usually an organisers main concerns. Steve Green and Bob Alderson had already had an initial meeting with the City Council, David Olivant was working away at the map and Tony Horsewill had agreed to plan.

We held a meeting with the Council in November and as always with orienteering the first task was to explain what we actually do. After they had understood that we wouldn’t all be starting at once and wouldn’t need any road closures they were very enthusiastic. It was agreed that we should ‘showcase’ the event by having the start, finish and assembly in Market Square. At this time we didn’t realise that the Big Wheel would be in residence although this turned out to be a big plus point, adding a great atmosphere to the event.

The initial charge that was quoted for using Market Square was £1000 – way above the budget for an orienteering event. This was reduced to £400 to include the provision of marquees and electricity and this seemed a more manageable figure. Subsequently some great work by Pauline Olivant enabled us to ‘do a deal’ whereby as a club we put on orienteering taster sessions in the City Parks (as part of the Summer League) and the Council waive the charge for the City Race – fantastic! Additionally we agreed to have a free Come and Try it event that we would use to attract non orienteers to have a go, and then publicise the Summer league park events – thanks to Catherine Hughes for taking this on.

What else was different about organising this type of event? It was really important to work closely with the planner to do the Risk Assessment. I now know that this is the main concern of a City race organiser. How to avoid competitors being squished by trams or run over by speeding traffic is really important. Interestingly the City Council did not need to see our risk assessment; they only needed to know that we had done one. The reason for this being that any incident that did then occur would be totally our problem.

The week leading up to the event was busy – the week after the JK was not a good date, with Mick Lucking (map printing) and Michael Napier (computing guru) extending their post JK stay in Devon until the day before the event. Steve Green used some of his excellent contacts to arrange an interview with the Evening Post, complete with colour photos – thanks Peter and Richard. I did an interview with Radio Nottingham and they subsequently arranged to send a reporter to cover the event and the ensuing feature was played on the breakfast show the next day.

The day itself was blessed with great weather and many compliments were received about the event – the location, the map and the courses. The Council were equally enthusiastic and are hoping that we can make it bigger and better next year and I hope so too. We would like to extend the map and include a different area of the city.

To all the NOC helpers on the day, many thanks for making the event a success. Any one fancy organising next year??
