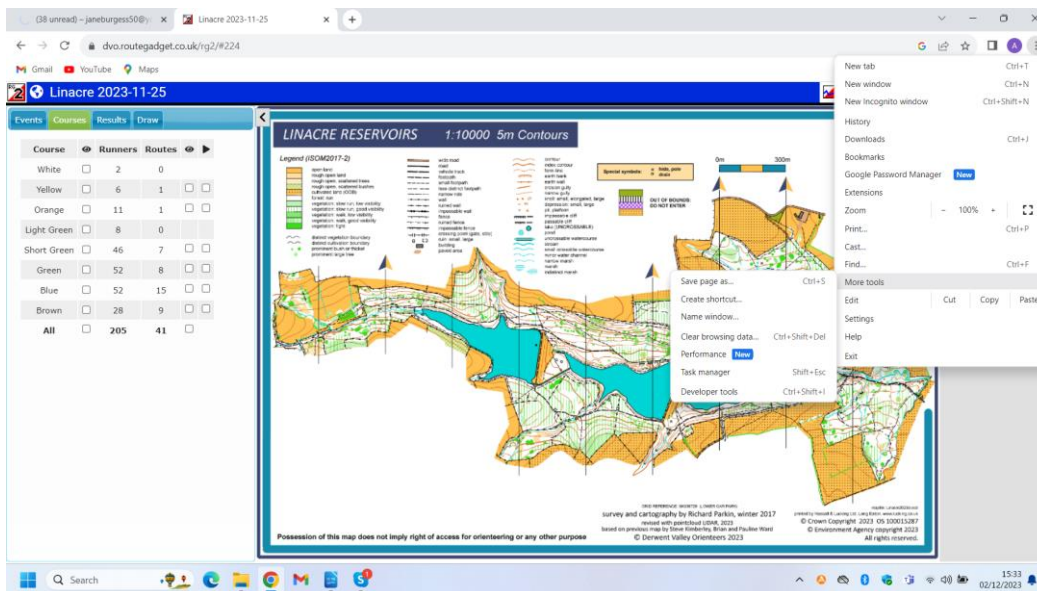


# Printing a map from RouteGadget

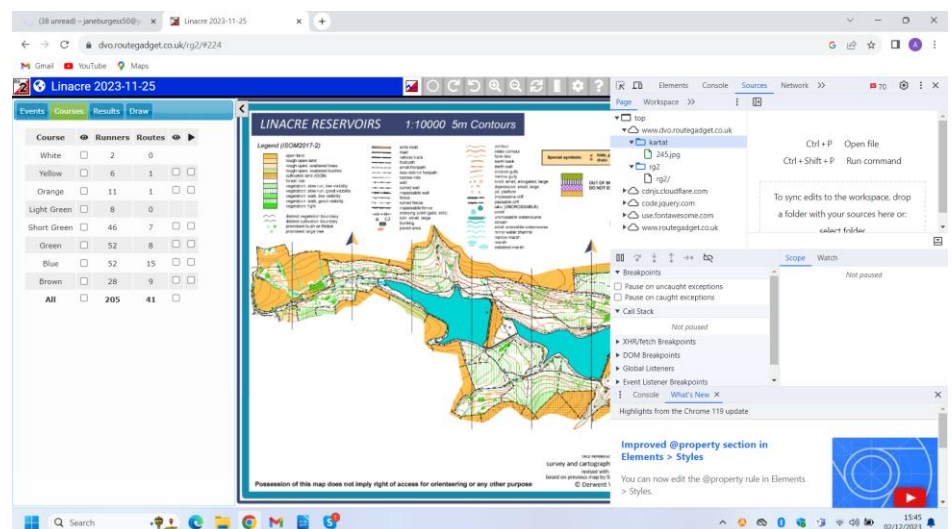
If you are even a semi-serious geek, this might be something new for you, and very simple. If you've been to an area before you will probably have a map, filed by area, date or whatever method you use. If you haven't, you might like to see one, work out where the start might be and where the event might take you to. RouteGadget will show you a whole heap of things that other people have done but you might want a map in your sticky hands to have a proper look. If you have ever tried screen printing a map from RouteGadget you will know that you end up with a muzzy, poorly defined image which is not fit for purpose. Until now.

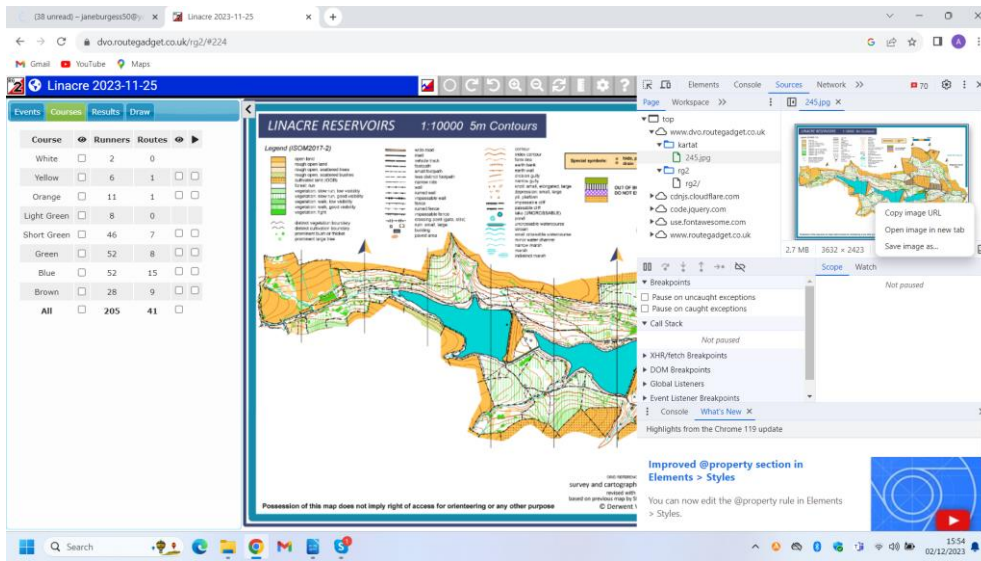
Note that Ant said this works in Chrome, which is what I have used. I really can't vouch for any other browser.



Open RouteGadget and bring up the area you want. Click on the three vertical dots at the top right-hand corner of the screen. Select More Tools then Developer Tools.

From the Menu bar at the top of the 'techy stuff', select Sources. This will bring up a hierarchy of files. Click on Kartat (maps in Finnish). A jpg, gif or other graphic file format will be shown, in this case 245.jpg.





Double click on the file and it will appear in the box to the far right. Right click on this image and you can open it in a new tab or save it as, in this instance, a jpeg file and print it.

Click the X to close the 'techy stuff'.
